Those of us whom have been in education long enough know that the pendulum of "best practices" can swing at any moment. We also know what the tried and true "best practices" really are. So, yes, current research and buzz words are all about "the science of reading." It is real. It makes sense. However, this does not mean we need to do away with what we already know to work. We know what adult readers and writers do, and our instruction should reflect upon that. In this session, we'll discuss the ways in which solid phonics instruction and word work can be incorporated into daily reading and writing sessions, especially if you're currently using the TC units of study/workshop models. You will leave with a better understanding of where and how to fit in solid phonics instruction/practice in your K-3 classroom.

B24-05 Uprooting Instructional Inequity (K-12)

At the center of the book is Berg's i3PD Planning Map, which guides teachers to recognize and reform ways their instructional practice may be contributing to inequity through four parts, which will be explored in this book study.
